A GROUP BULLETIN

About 70 years ago a young man left the Village of Seven Brothers in the mountains of Italy to seek his fortune in America. He wrote back to friends urging them to come too. A regular stream of emigrants came from the village, children were born in America and grew up. These boys and girls married and set up homes of their own. Today there are 300 of these families in Stamford, 125 in Manhattan, 150 in Queens and 100 in several other places. There is one in Utah, another in South Carolina and one of our people is in Nevada. All these families make up Our Group.

All of us are reaching forward, some rapidly, others more slowly, in pursuit of happiness in the American tradition. This is a great privilege. This bulletin is published in order to tell a little of who we are, where we come from and of how we are making use of this privilege. You will be surprised. Among us we have butchers, bakers, and candlestick makers. We have doctors, engineers and other professional people. The idea is for all of us to keep informed of progress and to co-ordinate all efforts toward a better future.

This is not an idle dream. It can be done. This bulletin, published in English and Italian, is proof that it can be done. As for its cost, a Financial Report will be given with each issue. Surely 700 families can get together to make up the small sum it will cost each month. Every effort will be made to send you one issue each month. If you know of any families not getting a copy, send us their names and addresses.

America says to us: Cooperate for your common welfare! Work together to make your lives happier and more fruitful. Let's pull together!

WHERE WE COME FROM

Most of our younger people have heard the older folk speak of the village of their origin. Exactly where is it? What kind of a place is it?

It lies on the top of a hill almost 2500 feet straight up in the foothills of the Apeninnines halfway between Rome and Naples. Monte Cassino, the monastery that was bombed, is 15 miles southwest of it. People first settled in our village 294 years before Christ was born. It's 2241 years old. That's a long time!

The present pastor of the village, Father Marsella, has written a scholarly work tracing the origin of the shrine to the Madonna of Canneto. This gives many interesting facts about the history of the village and is being translated by Mrs. Claudia Macari. It will be published in later editions of this bulletin.

WHO INVENTED THE ICE CREAM CONE?

That question sounds silly, doesn't it? Yet someone had to invent it, and whom do you suppose it was? A man from a hamlet called the Ancient Place near our village. His name was Antonio Valvona.

This man went to Manchester, England, about 50 years ago and sold ice cream to kids in the street. In those days they served it in a glass with a spoon. You can easily imagine what happened to those glasses! So Valvona had to find a way to stop his profits from being smashed in the street.

He remembered that when his mother sent him for a penny of salt in the village the store keeper rolled up a piece of paper into a cone and put the salt in it. He also remembered that his mother (continued on page 2)

Baseball was mentioned and we asked him if he could organize a ball team among our boys in New York to play a team of Stamford boys. This is what he said:

"Sure I can get together a New York Team. We'll play any team the Stamford people can get together. We'll beat the pants off those farmers! What do they know about baseball? They think a baseball is a kind of meatball. I saw them play once up there and instead of running to first base first, they ran to third and the other way round. ALHIONSE VACCA OF STAMFORD?

How many of us know that the Stamford High School Stadium was designed by Alphonse Vacca, architect, a proud member of our group? What is more, the basic idea for its design has its roots in the Village of Seven Brothers. This is how it happened.

Al was the Town Architect in the Stamford Engineer's Office. One day he got a call asking if he could have the plans for a high school stadium ready in a few weeks. He said he'd see what he could do. He sat at his desk for hours trying to figure out a plan, but nothing would come. He gave it up and went out to play cards with the boys.

In the middle of a game at about 11 pm he saw in his mind -- a wall. It was a wall that belonged to a man who owned a parrot in the village, he remembered. Al laid down his cards right there and went home. That wall became the basic idea for the new stadium. He worked all night. At 6 o'clock the next morning he awakened his family to show them the design. They thought it was beautiful. Then came days of painstaking work and finally the job of supervising the construction.

Now there stands the stadium behind the school. It is a tremendous structure of stone and concrete beautifully conceived. It weighs 1500 tons. They had to dig 27 feet below the ground to find support for it. Under the seats there are lockers, showers and there is steam heat. It accommodates 12,000 persons all of whom can get out of the stadium in $2\frac{1}{2}$ minutes.

As you look at it you feel transported back to the days of knights in armor. It seems as though they'll come out on their steads at any moment to do battle in the arena. Notice the huge stones on the sides of the road as you approach the entrance. Algot that idea from the roads built by Romans which he saw in Italy.

And that's how our village has left its mark in Stamford!

But best of all, Al likes to invent things. What's more, he's successful at it. His latest is a compact called the Double Check which throws a light on milday's face when she powders her nose in the dark. He has three patents for this item alone which was judged the best in a contest at Miami, Florida.

Al was born in Stamford. When he was 3 months old his father decided to take his children back to Italy for a while. He felt that in order to know America, his children should understand Italy first. They stayed 9 years. Back in Stamford, Al went to public school, high school, and then to the Pratt Institute in Brooklyn. In 1922 he set up business as architect in Stamford.

If you visit Al in his office at 1 Bank Street, you'll see drawers full of blue prints for homes and buildings that have gone up through the years. He designed a home for Guy Lombardo. His latest is an apærtment house for 108 families that is going up on Bedford Street. If you'll look up the magazine Better Homes and Gardens for September 1945, you'll find an article about a home that Al redesigned.

So that's Al. If you see a stocky man walking along the streets of Stamford with strong chisled features, he's the one. He'll probably appear to be walking in the clouds thinking of new designs and inventions. Tug at his sleeve, bring him back to earth for a moment and say, "Hello, Al!"

A WORD OF THANKS

In order to find out the names and addresses of our families for the purpose of sending them this bulletin, we got hold of every list we could find, called upon every family we knew, almost, phoned about 60 others, and looked up every familiar name in city directories. We had to have exact names and addresses because the post office people say they can not return too much mail when the postage is only a penny and a half. We had a lot of fun visiting old friends and making new ones. We wish to thank everyone who helped with this big job. We'd like to mention them all but lack the space.

If you live in Stamford, write to the Manager, V.A. Regional Office, 95 Pearl Street, Hartford 4. Tell him that you want Advisement and he'll tell you where to report.

The laws about your benefits are complicated. Get together with the veterans in your neighborhood and let us know. We'll make a date and talk things over.

SOCIETIES AND CLUBS

Social organizations of various kinds exist in our group. The first one was founded a few years after the first immigrant reached America. They have kept alive the spirit of brotherhood among our people for more than half a century and helped to relieve distress among families in the village in Italy after both world wars.

ALBERICO ANSERICI MUTUAL AID SOCIETY OF SEVEN BROTHERS

This is our oldest organization having been founded in 1891. It is named after Alberico Anserici, a monk who lived in our village in 1201 and who wrote about certain visions that he had. It is believed that Dante got some of his ideas for the Divine Comedy from the writings of this Alberico Anserici.

Members pay \$2.00 per month. In return, they get free medical attention, \$14.00 per week for the first 12 weeks of illness, \$10.00 for the remaining 40 weeks, \$400 upon death of a member and \$100 in case his wife dies. CAPTAIN ALESSANDRO VENTURINI MUTUAL AID SOCIETY OF STAMFORD

This society was founded in 1915. It is named after a Settefratese who was killed in the First World War. For oneyear before this organization was founded there existed a branch of the Alberico Anserici Society of N.Y. in Stamford. which became part of the CAV in 1916. As its name implies, this also is a mutual aid society. Members pay \$2.00 per month and in return they receive medical attention, \$10.00 per week for the first 6 months of illness; \$3.00 for the next 3 months, \$2.50 for the last 3 months and \$400 in case of death. SEVEN BROTHERS SOCIAL CLUB OF STAMFORD

MEN'S BRANCH. One winter day in 1931 a couple of our men were standing and shivering on a street corner in Stamford trying to forget the cold. One of them perked up and said:

"Now look her fellows. What are we doing here freezing in our boots? We need a place where we can be warm and where we can talk and relax. Why don't we form a club?"

They started right then and there by renting a garage. They built a fire in the middle of it and started talking about a club. Money was scarce in those days so they each chipped in a gallon of wine. They played cards for that wine, losers paying up as is the custom and soon they had a few dollars. With this they rented a better place. Later they heard of some property for sale on Virgil Street. Those men who could afford it chipped in a little money apiece and in this manner they got together enough to buy the place.

Today the organization is a prosperous going concern. They operate their own tavern and as soon as building materials are more reasonable they're going to build a large recreation hall. There are 78 members and only Settefratesi may join.
