According to an ancient legend, a Lady resplendent in celestial beauty whose eyes shown brighter than the sun appeared before a shepherdess named Silvana in the Valley of Canneto high up above the Village of Seven Brothers. She commanded the trembling girl to go to the Pastor of the village and tell him that the Mother of Christ wanted a church built in that valley.


The girl said that she could not abandon her sheep because she had to take them down to the plain to drink as there wasn't a drop of water to be had up there in the mountain valley. Thereupon the Lady touched a stone with her prodigious fingers and suddenly there bubbled up a fountain of fresh water from the ground. It flows among the flowers of the valley and then gathering momentum it cascades over boulders down the mountain to form the stream known today as the Melfa.

The church was built and to this day it can be reached only by a footpath through the forest. Every year, since time immemorial, from the 18th to the 22nd of August about 50,000 pilgrims from 150 different villages go there to pay homage to the Madonna. Their journey is an act of devotion to their faith, their ideal of brotherly love and of peace among men.

These are festive days in the village: The pastoral country-side becomes a sea of humanity. Everybody is out to have a good time. There are masquerade parties, contests, fireworks, and plenty of food. For four days and nights the town vibrates with excitement and song.

No one who has ever been there ever forgets it. That's why, come the 18th of August, our folks who were brought up in the village get the urge to have a feast!


CLUB ACTIVITIES ...
